

GRADUATE WORKSHOP WITH MOHAMED AMJAHID

As a freelance investigative journalist, <u>Mohamed Amjahid</u> regularly covers topics such as racism and police violence in Germany, the upheavals in the Middle East and North Africa as well as far-right and "anti-woke" politics in the US and their global impact.

This year, he wrote a critical piece on the history of <u>Quran burnings in Europe</u> for the weekly <u>Der Spiegel</u> and articles on patriarchal, heteronormative, anti-LGBTQ+ policies in the US and Germany (e.g. "<u>Don't Say Gay' und Ron DeSantis</u> - Wie ein Gesetz Queers in Florida bedroht" (WDR); "<u>Rechte Mütter machen mobil</u> gegen Queers und Transgender" (Der Freitag)). Samples of his work will be made available.

Mo is the author of *Among Whites. What It Means to Be Privileged* (Hanser Berlin, 2017) and *Whitewash*: A Guide to Antiracist Thinking (Piper, 2021), which received much popular and critical acclaim. Last year, he published a compelling travelogue, *Let's Talk about Sex, Habibi. Love and Desire from Casablanca to Cairo* (Piper), which offers a nuanced portray of the region and challenges Western stereotypes and prejudices against Muslims.
