Since the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic and post-truth discourses surrounding its origins, and the growth of global Black Lives Matter protests in response to the daylight murder of George Floyd, the world has witnessed a massive surge in anti-Black and anti-Asian sentiment, as well as mass demonstrations of anti-racist solidarity. Incidents of racialized violence against Black and Asian peoples, enduring feelings of racialized resentment, and widespread resistance to racism define the social, political, and affective landscapes of our present moment.

This roundtable asks: How does emerging scholarship in the humanities and social sciences explain these social and political trends? How does anti-Black and anti-Asian racism play out in Baltimore? What is the role of institutions such as Johns Hopkins in structuring and enabling the perpetuation of racial discrimination, and what are the possibilities of new institutional commitments to interrupt such racism? In what ways might humanistic thought contribute to political projects that dismantle racism and build up anti-racist solidarities?

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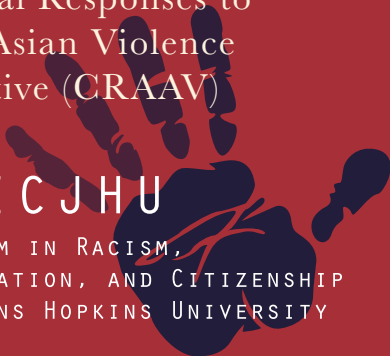
